COMMUNITY



CULTIVATING AN INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY

Helping our community is at the core of all of Partneriaeth Ogwen's activities, and our community services have increased in 2024.

Community Councils

Partneriaeth Ogwen provides a clerical service to three Community Councils - Bethesda Community Council, Llandygai Community Council and Llanllechid Community Council. The clerical work includes organising, preparing documents and taking minutes at Council meetings; dealing with correspondence and inquiries from the public; and managing finances on behalf of the Councils. The Clerks also lead with additional work such as coordinating the Llanllechid Mountain Committee's grazing payment system and organising the councils' Finance Sub-Committees. The service is provided by a team of professional staff who provide a high quality service to the councils. The service is led by Bethan Wyn Roberts who is the clerk for Bethesda Community Council and Llandygai Community Council and Caroline Jones is the clerk for Llanllechid Community Council.

With the support of Bethesda Community Council, Morgan Griffith is also employed as a Maintenance Officer to carry out maintenance and litter collection in the area.

In addition to the clerical work, the clerks have supported improvements on the memorial pillars in Bethesda, funded the Youth Club, weighed in on traffic issues in the area and led on the Tregarth Community Centre Mural and Bus Shelter Mural project in Talybont.

Partneriaeth Ogwen Offices

Partneriaeth Ogwen has 4 workplaces where our staff are based. These include the Partneriaeth Ogwen Office, Dyffryn Gwyrdd Office, Hwb Ogwen and a new office at Canolfan Cefnfaes.

Our offices receive a high number of visitors who call in for a wide variety of reason, including: queries from community councillors, queries for the police, requests for assistance and general inquiries.

Volunteering

Partneriaeth Ogwen has over 84 active volunteers who help with various projects. We also have county and community councillors who volunteer their time to oversee our work on the Partneriaeth Ogwen Management Committee. Additionally, we work closely with the local schools to offer meaningful volunteering experiences for local young people within our community. 56 young people from local secondary schools have volunteered this year as part of projects such as Bro Ogwen, the Duke of Edinburgh Award and Dychmygu'r Dyfodol (Imagining the Future). The volunteering experiences vary from helping in the food club, taking part in the 'litter pick' sessions, cooking in the Swpar Chwaral food sessions, volunteering with Siop Ogwen, and also community gardening.



NATASHA

VOLUNTEER

I originally come from Kiyv, Ukraine and I moved to Dyffryn Ogwen in November 2022 in the wake of war.

I heard of volunteering opportunities with Hwb Ogwen from my social worker, and I'm very thankful for it.

I study at Coleg Menai 4 days a week and volunteer with Partneriaeth Ogwen Food Club on Friday afternoons.

Volunteering with everyone in the Food Club has helped my English but I'm also learning some Welsh. I also want to teach Russian to everyone. The opportunity is here to practice my Welsh and English, speaking the languages is a big help to my confidence.

The team is very supportive and help me with any challenges I face, I look forward to come by and see everyone every week, not only the Food Club team, but the attendees also. I'm starting to get to know the people in the community, and everyone is so friendly and nice. I'm very thankful for the opportunity to volunteer within the Dyffryn Ogwen community.











Haia, I'm Parker. I'm originally from Wyoming but now I'm from nowhere! Which is fun to say because it sounds so dramatic. The truth is I have been traveling for six years so it's quite common for me to pop into a small town and volunteer, get to know people, learn new recipes, and tame the local cats, and this time, I landed on Bethesda! I consider myself very lucky to have the opportunity to live here over the next few months so thank you very much!

If you're very bored, here's a bit of my history. My dad was a cowboy who worked in a coal mine in Wyoming - sheep farming doesn't pay in America. Mum worked in a school but when they divorced she worked two jobs for years. Fair play mum. Both of them have retired by now and my dad lives in a cottage far away in the mountains - you can't drive there in the winter, and every now and then a bear or a wild animal will drop by. Mum's fond of well-being, going on trips with me and she's always a big fan of my gossiping and complaints.

I went to Evergreen State College in Olympia, Washington where I studied "Mass Incarceration and the School to Prison Pipeline" and communityisation. It's a hippy University, so there was no program. I had the opportunity to create my own, so I studied contemporary and historical racism in America. Through this, I managed to do an internship in a prison for young men aged 16-21 with a group of people from my university, and then I studied communityisation to change the social systems responsible for creating situations and conditions that increase the possibilities of someone going to jail rather than university. I have worked in schools, homeless shelters, and farms since then.

After graduating, I saw the importance of knowing if I could trust in other people and a higher power, so I bought a ticket to Europe without a plan of where I was going to stay or what I was going to do, so I thumped around, working in Dhamma centers, on farms looking after horses, in B&B's, chip shops, pizzerias and more. Last year I moved to Drefriw in Dyffryn Conwy for a while where I learned Welsh through speaking with everyone in Llanrwst and volunteering with Menter laith Conwy. Next year I'm going to study counselling at Bangor University.



YOUNG PEOPLE

For the first seven months of 2024, Anna Sethi worked as our Young People's Officer with funding through Llwyddo'n Lleol. During this period, Anna worked closely with Gwynedd Youth Service and the local schools to organise and support workshops and volunteering opportunities for young people.

Anna also started the Entrepreneurship Club with funding from Adra, which provided local young people the opportunity to start a business using the Gofod Gwneud Maker Space machines. These young entrepreneurs then set up stalls at local events to sell the products they had created.

In addition, with funding from Elusen Ogwen and other sources, Partneriaeth Ogwen was once again able to organise a series of free activities for families during the school holidays.

Below is an overview of what has been achieved.





Dychmygu'r Dyfodol

This year, Partneriaeth Ogwen worked in partnership with the People's Economy, Ysgol Dyffryn Ogwen, Gwynedd Youth Service and GISDA to bring an exciting new project to the young people of Dyffryn Ogwen. By working with an Imagination Practitioner, a group of young people were led through a series of workshops where they had the opportunity to imagine a Dyffryn Ogwen they would like to live in.

Artist Menai Rowlands brought their imaginary Dyffryn Ogwen from 2034 to life and presented it to local stakeholders in an in-person and online exhibition. We had a great response from local councillors and other stakeholders, who worked with the young people to take concrete steps to develop their ideas. The actions included women-only sessions in Byw'n lach gyms, a Youth Club suitable for 10 year olds up to year 13, as well as having the opportunity to voice their opinion on transport issues that affect their ability to reach jobs and education opportunities.







POVERTY PREVENTION

The main poverty prevention development during 2023 and 2024 has been the establishment and development of Hwb Ogwen - a community hub that provides advice to local residents to prevent poverty. This is done in drop-in sessions twice a week where local residents can access emergency food packs, fuel vouchers through the Fuel Bank Foundation and energy and money saving advice.


Since January 2024, we have achieved the following –

- 2,156 visitors to Hwb Ogwen between January and the end of November 2024
- 190 new visitors have visited the Hwb
- 754 Food Packs distributed and 20 further referrals to Arfon or Bangor Food Bank
- 208 Fuel Vouchers issued worth £12,282
- 34 SIM Cards issued
- 66 people have received Gwynedd Digital advice
- 19 people have visited Citizens Advice
- 346 have received help from the Hwb Officer on a number of issues, e.g. help with benefit applications, help with filling in forms such as blue badge applications
- 29 Winter packs delivered

Hwb Ogwen also leads on the Swpar Chwaral scheme which cooks nutritious meals for local residents once a month. The food is cooked by the Hwb's staff with the help of local volunteers. We also use local food donations, contributions from the Fareshare scheme and financial donations from organisations to finance the costs of the scheme.

During 2024, the weekly sessions have created 129 hot meals.

The Food Club

With the support of the Fareshare scheme, the Hwb Ogwen team has continued to share food that would have gone to waste.

Following consultation with users it was decided to review the food-sharing system and charge a fee for each weekly bag. Now, a portion of the Fareshare food is used towards Hwb Ogwen's work - specifically Swpar Chwaral nights and emergency food packs, but the rest of the produce is packaged for the Food Club members who come to collect their bags every Friday. A bag is £5, and for that price members get at least £10 worth of different foods helping to reduce waste. It appeals to a wide cross-section of society - families as well as single people; local residents of all ages; and to those in employment and unemployed people. The Food Club has been a very successful venture with over 180 members making use of the service and an average of 30 bags per week being shared. This means that 180kgs per week of food is saved from going to waste. The financial saving is a minimum of £5 per week per bag, an average of 30 members per week, which is a total of £5,550 of savings for the community in the last year.

During 2024 -

- 1,218 bags were distributed
- 8,460kgs of food waste was saved.
- £5,899 was saved for our community



Collaboration with partners

In addition to services from Hwb Ogwen staff, our officers have organised drop-in sessions with Citizens Advice, Citizens Online, Gwaith Gwynedd, North Wales Housing Associations, GISDA, Tŷ Gobaith, and Unpaid Carers.

The following funders have contributed to the running costs of Hwb Ogwen during 2024 - Penrhyn Estate (Douglas Pennant Trustees), Cyngor Gwynedd-Shared Prosperity Fund and Cost of Living Fund, Tesco, and National Energy Action.

We have also received very generous donations of money and food from Tal y Bont Church, Carmel Chapel, Plaid Cymru, Blakemore, Neville and Angharad Hughes and the Bethesda, Llandygai and Llanllechid Community Councils. We are also very grateful to everyone who donates products to the donation basket in Londis.

Energy Warden

With the support of Rural Energy Developments (DEG), the position of Energy Warden has continued in 2024.

The Warden works at Hwb Ogwen and arranges appointments to give energy advice in our community on issues such as fuel poverty and benefits. By having a consistent presence on the High Street two days a week, Hwb Ogwen has won the community's trust in our services by offering advice and support both at the Hwb and through home visits.

Community Friend

Linda Brown has been offering a vital role as a Community Friend, offering companionship and emotional support to older and lonely residents in the area. Her work focuses on improving the wellbeing and social connection of up to 15 individuals each week, many of whom are socially isolated due to age, health, mobility problems, or lack of family presence.



Linda's visits include regular checkups and spending quality time with these older members of our community. The activities vary and depend on needs and preferences of the individuals. They include:

- Friendly conversations
- Accompany them on walks or to local facilities
- Offering an ear to listen to their concerns
- Provide light assistance with daily tasks

This interaction provides much-needed companionship. It helps alleviate feelings of loneliness, which can have a significant impact on mental and physical health, particularly among the older population.

Linda's role promotes a sense of community and reduces social isolation, which is a growing issue. By regularly visiting and connecting with these individuals, Linda:

- Improves their mood and mental well-being
- Encourages them to take part in local activities when possible
- Provides an informal system of emotional support, giving them someone to talk to regularly

The people Linda visits often express appreciation for her company, emphasising how her visits give them something to look forward to and break up the monotony of their week.

Linda's contribution as a Community Friend is extremely valuable. It provides vital emotional support to vulnerable members of our community, helping them to maintain contact with the outside world. Not only does her work have an impact on the lives of the elderly she visits but also enriches the community by fostering a sense of sociability and compassion.



DYFFRYN CAREDIG

Dyffryn Caredig was established in November 2023 with the support of the Pawb a'i Le Community Lottery fund. This followed on from Dyffryn Gwyrdd's previous work, but this project has a specific emphasis on community transport.


During the first year of Dyffryn Caredig, five jobs carried over from Dyffryn Gwyrdd and two new jobs were created. Using our five 100% electric vehicles, 1,454 journeys were completed over the 12 months. These varied from short trips in our MPV vehicle (Efan) to the Surgery in Bethesda, regular transport for Ysgol Dyffryn Ogwen in the two mini-buses, food collections and deliveries in the small white van (Tryfan) to personal trips in the family car (Carnedd) all over Wales and England. Another aspect of this work which became popular very quickly is shopping and well-being trips on Saturdays for local residents. These trips are primarily to local shopping destinations, but occasionally further afield along the coast or across the border.

During this period, 120 of the above total were private trips in Carnedd, which is available for hire on Co-Wheels. That partnership came to an end in October 2024 and we are working on a new arrangement with TrydaNi to enable us to carry on providing this important local service. Although this car has been popular enough (it travelled over 30,000 miles during its three years with us) and has opened the eyes of many people in the area to electric travel, the business relationship with Co-Wheels was not the best and we hope to create a more equal relationship with TrydaNi for the future.

During the period of this report, not only has our number of journeys and mileage increased, but also the number of passengers using our services has also gone up.

During the year, the number of new passengers has increased significantly to 160. The majority of these passengers come from the work with Ysgol Dyffryn Ogwen, but we have also attracted new users from associations such as Cymdeithas Hanes Ogwen, regular work for Active Dementia, additional work for visits by organisations such as the Wales Landscape Partnership, local Mountaineering Leaders, etc. Also encouraging is the increase in individual members who use our vehicles as they do not drive, do not have access to a vehicle, or find it difficult to catch Arriva buses - cases identified by research in 2018 by Partneriaeth Ogwen as the basis for the Dyffryn Gwyrdd application. It is also pleasing to report that there has been progress in the work carried out for Cyngor Gwynedd departments, such as with Gwynedd Oed Gyfeillgar recently and in partnership with Plas Ogwen for leisure trips for residents, transporting Cylch Meithrin Cefnfaes to them for sessions and for transporting residents to and from the home for periods of time. In addition, individuals have registered as new users and have been transported for a variety of reasons - surgery, dentist and hospital appointments, shopping and leisure trips, and also, recently, for transport to work.

A significant outcome of Dyffryn Caredig, and one that is all-important as communities try to mitigate the impact of global warming, is to reduce our carbon emissions. Through the above work carried out transporting residents in our zero-emission vehicles we have saved 12.6 tonnes of carbon dioxide -https://co2.myclimate.org/en/calculate_emissions.

New electric bus from Ynni Ogwen

A big thank you to Ynni Ogwen for supporting the community transport service of Partneriaeth Ogwen by sponsoring a new electric bus. This was possible because of the profits from the successful hydro-electric scheme. The mini-bus is mostly used by the local schools during the week, with community use at weekends.

The response to the bus has been very positive from users.

Ceinwen Hughes, Bethesda "This service of taking people to appointments from Partneriaeth Ogwen is priceless, I can drive but I can't take the car to Ysbyty Gwynedd - the parking is too far from the building. Being able to get transport from the house right to the door of the hospital is amazing. Thank you very much."

Michelle Rowlands "I've just started using Carnedd, Partneriaeth Ogwen's electric car. When I joined Co-Wheels, the membership card came in the post and then I was ready to go. Using this car works great for me for several different reasons - the price is good, it's automatic and it's located at the Library within walking distance. Also, running a car, especially for someone who doesn't use it often, has become a huge expense. The diesel is expensive, maintenance not to mention insurance costs. Being able to hire the car by the hour or day suits me - and it's good for the environment when charging through Partneriaeth Ogwen's solar panels! I would tell anyone who is thinking of hiring, changing a car or thinking of going down from two cars to one to try this new system".





Beics Ogwen

Another important element of Dyffryn Caredig's work to strengthen the fabric of our community is the bicycle project, Beics Ogwen. During the period of this report Beics Ogwen has continued to offer a bike hire and repair service. Kyle Locke was appointed as Bike Coordinator in February 2024. Over the past nine months Kyle has followed a Cytech training course and set about re-introducing Beics Ogwen. During this period there have been 65 hires for members of the public and three school sessions have been held in partnership with the Sustrans charity.

Two Accessible Bikes sessions were also held with the Active Dementia crew at Bethesda Rugby Club and those sessions were very well received. During this period, two successful applications were also made for summer activities for local families making use of bicycles and purchasing scooters and safety equipment to extend the range of the project's activities. These activities were supported by Elusen Ogwen and the North Wales Police Summer Activities fund and we are very grateful to them for their support. It was a battle against the weather to hold outside activities this year, but one of the sessions, Hwyl Haf Beics, was extremely successful. At the same time as this work, 21 bike and scooter handling and repair sessions were held, and the repair work was developed for local residents, and with Kyle getting to know the residents of the Valley we hope to see this element grow over the next 12 months.

SPF Project - Gwynedd Community Transport

Another project implemented during the period of this report is the Gwynedd Community Transport partnership in collaboration with members of Dolan - Yr Orsaf, O Ddrws i Ddrws and Y Dref Werdd. This project was established in July 2023 which meant that we were able to take advantage of the partners' skills and share our knowledge for the benefit of the residents of other areas of Gwynedd. This joint project intends to extend green community transport in order to provide services to the most needy in our communities. As well as providing practical solutions to our communities, this project has meant that we have developed strategic work with the partners and with the Community Transport Association (CTA). A good example of this was the Gwynedd Community Transport Round Table event held at Canolfan Cefnfaes at the beginning of June. Over 40 attendees came together to discuss and work on the way forward for community transport in the area with attendees from the Cyngor Gwynedd, Transport for Wales and other organisations interested in developing a connected network of green community services.

ENVIRONMENT



COMMUNITY GROWTH PROJECTS AND ENVIRONMENTAL VOLUNTEERING FOR THE BENEFIT OF WELL-BEING

Community Gardens

Thanks to a grant from the Wales Council for Voluntary Action, we have employed Barry Roberts as a community gardener since March 2024. Barry works with volunteers in the community to maintain public spaces in Tan Twr and Llys Dafydd as well as maintaining the land around the allotments and community gardens in Gardd Ffrancon. Barry has also been helping community groups to maintain other spaces such as the Tal y Bont playing field and Caban Gerlan. We have been working together with the Balchder Bro Ogwen crew to look after the hanging baskets on Bethesda's high street and to plant daffodils in the area ready for spring.

We would also like to acknowledge the hard work of a small grWe up of volunteer community gardeners who have been growing food in Gardd Ffrancon and helping with the maintenance of Llys Dafydd. One of the highlights of the year was the jam making workshops at Cefnfaes Centre using fruit from the community garden.



PETHA

Since the Petha pilot scheme ended in 2023, Partneriaeth Ogwen has been working with Cyngor Gwynedd and Benthyg Cymru to run the Petha Library in partnership with Cyngor Gwynedd's Library Services. Over the past year, we have been starting processes to enable electrical equipment to be available through the library. Through Circular Economy funding with Menter Môn, Cyngor Gwynedd and the Welsh Government, we will employ a Petha Library Officer to start in January 2025 to help us develop and promote Petha with the intention of making the Petha Library sustainable before the current round of funding ends in March 2026.

TACKLING CLIMATE CHANGE

GwyrddNi

GwyrddNi has started the work of realizing the Community Action Plan. Highlights of the year include:

A Climate Festival in Tregarth where 25 volunteers put together a packed programme of talks, trips and activities with over 120 people attending on the day, it was a good way to start a conversation about the climate crisis and local solutions.

Over the winter, monthly moss trips were held in the local area led by Emily Meilleur with over 50 people having been on one of these trips. The work continues to create a map of moss that can be seen along the Afon Caseg which will be able to be shared locally.



GwyrddNi also works closely with schools in the area and has held an introduction session to climate change in 3 local schools. The next step with the schools is to support the pupils to act themselves. We support a volunteer to maintain Ysgol Abercaseg's garden where pupils can learn about growing food.

In the autumn term, a questionnaire was shared with school pupils in the area to understand more about their travel habits to school. There were 314 responses and we are now working with the children and young people to see how we could support them to walk or cycle to school more often. This comes after a travel to work campaign in April where our volunteers helped people who wanted to start cycling to work.



Zero Net Gwynedd and Pioneering Places

Partneriaeth Ogwen remains a partner in the Zero Net Gwynedd project. A scheme led by Adra housing association which aims to improve the energy efficiency of homes across Gwynedd.

During 2024, Partneriaeth Ogwen and Ynni Ogwen were partners in the Pioneering Places project led by Cyngor Gwynedd and Energy Local. The intention of the plan is to look at new methods of supplying energy locally. The project funded a report mapping the renewable energy potential of the Valley and another report looking at the potential of a green transport network.

We are now on phase 2 of the project with £2 million worth of funding from Innovate UK to develop the project further in Bethesda and Blaenau Ffestiniog.

LANGUAGE AND CULTURE

Promoting the Welsh language

We continue to promote and use the Welsh language in all of our activities, most importantly by managing our organisation and projects through the medium of Welsh. We offer Welsh-medium employment and volunteering opportunities for local people and are delighted by the fact that many learners volunteer and improve their Welsh with us. During 2024, with the support of the Arfor Enterprising Communities fund which reinforces the economy in Welsh-speaking areas, we are extremely proud to have offered marketing and community finance services to our community through the medium of Welsh.

Siop Ogwen

Although the shop is an independent legal entity, Partneriaeth Ogwen continues to manage the shop's administration and to support the Development Officer in managing the shop's work programme and activities. The shop contributes towards the viability of the High Street but it is also important in terms of promoting the Welsh language and literature.

We were delighted to be able to support 2 book launches by two local authors recently - Rhuo ei distawrwydd hi, first volume of poetry by Meleri Davies and V + Fo, Gwenno Gwilym's first novel.

Cultural Projects and Gŵyl Gwenllian

During 2024, Partneriaeth Ogwen has collaborated with partners to provide 35 cultural events and workshops in Dyffryn Ogwen, which is 15 more than our target for the year.

- Working with Penrhyn Castle National Trust on their "Reframing" workshops and exhibitions along with their Christmas art project
- Supporting the Welsh Slate Museum with engagement projects including workshops to celebrate 150 years of the North Wales Quarry Union
- Supporting a local creative writing group with their fortnightly meetings
- Children's book launch events and the holding of Cerddi Canol Pnawn literary events
- Working with Storiel to hold a series of workshops with year 6
 pupils to discuss themes relating to Yr Hen Bost Heritage Centre
- An exhibition and conversation with female artists from Dyffryn Ogwen in partnership with CARN as part of the Gwenllïan Festival (see below)

In June 2024, Partneriaeth Ogwen held the Gwenllïan Festival - a weekend of cultural and artistic activities to celebrate the women of the Carneddau. The festival included a guided tour in the Carneddau with one of the volunteer Lowland Guides and the Carneddau Landscape Partnership; art and cultural activities for the family; an exhibition and celebration of female artists from Dyffryn Ogwen; and a literature night and open mic for local writers.





Promoting the Use of the Welsh Language by Local Businesses

Partneriaeth Ogwen's language policy is fundamental to our working practices, and we take every opportunity to encourage use by businesses and partners locally. This includes helping local businesses to create bilingual content for the www.ogwen.cymru businesses on this digital community platform.

Promoting local Heritage with the Carneddau Landscape Partnership

Partneriaeth Ogwen was part of a Service Level Agreement with the Carneddau Landscape Partnership between April 2023 and August 2024 to carry out projects for the Partnership in Dyffryn Ogwen. During this year, Partneriaeth Ogwen has delivered the following projects through this agreement.

- Lleisiau Lleol An oral history project linked to Lleisiau Carneddau. A group of volunteers received training and have started conducting oral history interviews. These recordings have been uploaded to the People's Collection website (https://www.casgliadywerin.cymru/users/114406) which means that they are available to everyone. The aim is to build on this collection and work with partners in the community to offer our services. For example, we helped facilitate an event with Caban Gerlan to collect the history of Gerlan and Ysgol y Gerlan in October. During the lively community sessions, over 120 photos and documents were collected with their histories and stories which have been uploaded to the People's Collection for the future.
- Local Lowland Leader Training 14 local people have received Lowland Guide training with the intention of ensuring that everyone is fully qualified by March 2025. We will then be in a position to offer a series of free local walks with these volunteer guides.
- Interpretation Board We are currently in the process of erecting an interpretation board outside Plas Ffrancon which will identify all the mountains that can be viewed from there. This work should be completed in April 2025.
- laith Pesda With the help of local expert Mary Jones and local craftsman Alun Davies, Ysgol Penybryn pupils had the opportunity to learn about some traditional words and phrases used in Bethesda and create decorative slates celebrating them. They also helped create a resource explaining the words and their definitions. The slates were displayed over the summer in shop windows on the High Street.

ECONOMY

SUPPORTING SMALL AND MEDIUM-SIZED BUSINESSES AND REVITALIZING THE HIGH STREET

Property

Our property portfolio is comprised of:

- Buildings we have purchased through a grant and/or loan and/or Partneriaeth Ogwen's reserves (e.g. 26 and 27 Stryd Fawr and the Spar Building)
- Buildings we are responsible for through a 'beneficial ownership' agreement with Bethesda Community Council
- Buildings we have a lease on from Cyngor Gwynedd (Dyffryn Ogwen Community Library and Canolfan Cefnfaes)

Shops, Flats and Studios for local tenants

Partneriaeth Ogwen continues to administer units on Bethesda High Street under a 'beneficial ownership' agreement with Bethesda Community Council. All commercial units are fully occupied and the tenants include:

Tŷ Mo – a local company that brews beer and runs a tap house

Menai Seafood Company – a local seafood business

Shop 55 – antiques shop

Annie's Orphans – a charity shop selling second-hand clothes, toys and books

We also hire 2 studios for local creative companies – 9Bach – musical artists who hail from Gerlan Studio Ffram – a local company that frames pictures.

Six flats are also let to local tenants and commercial units are rented out in Canolfan Cefnfaes. The rental income of this property goes towards the maintenance costs of the buildings and the running costs of the Partneriaeth Ogwen which includes employing a Property Caretaker one day a week.

Yn ystod 2024, llwyddodd Grosvenor Construction Ltd i ennill y contract adeiladu ar Yr Hen Bost. Ar hyn o bryd, disgwylir i'r gwaith ddechrau ym mis Ionawr 2025. Rydym wedi cynnal ymgynghoriad cymunedol helaeth trwy gydol y flwyddyn, gan gyrraedd dros 700 o bobl trwy ddigwyddiadau, gweithdai a holiaduron.

During 2024, Grosvenor Construction Ltd won the construction contract on Yr Hen Bost. At present, work is expected to start in January 2025.

We have carried out extensive community consultation throughout the year, reaching over 700 people through events, workshops and questionnaires.

Cadwyn Ogwen

Unfortunately, despite the efforts to try new ideas and expand the Cadwyn Ogwen network, there was no corresponding increase in sales or customers. We subsequently brought he project to an end in February 2024.

Gofod Gwneud

Through Circular Economy and Cyngor Gwynedd funding, a Maker Space has been established in Canolfan Cefnfaes to offer access to machines such as a 3D printer, sublimation printer and heat presses, laser cutter and vinyl cutter.

With the help of funding from Menter Môn and the Circular Economy, we have held 31 free sessions in the Maker Space this year, which have varied from induction sessions with the machines, craft sessions for families, art sessions for young people, talks by artists, and more. We have also been able to offer time with technicians for individuals and businesses who want to use the machines for leisure and business purposes.

In 2025, we will look for ways to build a community of users of the Maker Space, increase capacity and confidence with the machines within Partneriaeth Ogwen staff, and find ways to generate income for the space in order to make it sustainable once this funding period ends in March 2026.









Business Support Services and other Enterprises

In 2023, Partneriaeth Ogwen was successful with an application to the Arfor Communities Fund to provide a community mentoring scheme. The mentoring includes financial and marketing mentoring with the intention of helping small and medium businesses and local organisations. As part of the finance mentoring work, we offer various services to local businesses and individuals which include book-keeping, setting up financial processes for new businesses, a payroll service and mentoring individuals with their self assessment. Since starting this work, Lliwen Morris our Community Finance Mentor has set up a new accounting system for Cymunedoli Cyf and received a transfer of a payroll service from Cyngor Gwynedd for employers who receive direct payments for carers with the intention of developing this with the Council in 2025. By the end of 2024, she had also mentored 35 local businesses and individuals as well as creating almost £10,000 of income for the partnership through this service.







Canolfan Cefnfaes

The refurbished areas at Canolfan Cefnfaes have now been open since mid-2023, and have seen a massive increase in community use in 2024. Rooms can be booked using our Simply Book platform:

The Community Room and kitchen are regularly booked for events and meetings by local associations, colleges, health workers and community groups. This year, we also worked with Dyffryn Ogwen Camera Club to install acoustic panels showing original photos by club members of Dyffryn Ogwen at its best.

A coworking space - Cydweithfa - has been open since January 2024, and has had a number of regular users and positive feedback from those who have used the space. During the summer, we saw a number of visitors to the area using the space, but local people have not yet adopted the space as we would have hoped. In 2025, we will be looking to work with partners, such as North Wales Tech, to hold events in the space as well as considering how we can work together with other projects, such as Beics Ogwen.

Canolfan Cefnfaes is also currently home to three commercial tenants - Black Dragon Marial Arts, Relics Plastic Recycling, and the Carneddau Landscape Partnership. The Youth Club also uses the rooms on the ground floor for their weekly meetings.

In May 2024, Ynni Ogwen installed 91 solar panels on the roof of Canolfan Cefnfaes to help increase energy efficiency in the building and ensure a green energy source for the charging points of our fleet of electric vehicles. Since their installation, there has been a significant reduction in the building's running costs, and during July, the building was completely self-sufficient for 23 out of 31 days.

IN MAY 2024 WE INSTALLED 91 SOLAR PANELS ON OUR ROOF

Have you noticed the solar panels on the roof of Cefnfaes? The 91 panels were installed in May 2024 and have a production capacity of 39.13kWp. We are grateful to Ynni Ogwen, our sister enterprise, for financing the panels and for providing us with a regular supply of clean electricity. We anticipate that the panels will produce approximately 32,600kWh of renewable energy each year. This will significantly reduce the building's carbon footprint and save around 150 tonnes of carbon emissions over 20 years.

Since buying the old Spar property in 2022, Partneriaeth Ogwen has been raising capital and implementing plans to refurbish the building into a new heritage centre for Dyffryn Ogwen alongside commercial units.

During 2024, Grosvenor Construction Ltd was awarded the construction contract on Yr Hen Bost. At present, work is expected to start in January 2025.

We have carried out extensive community consultation throughout the year, reaching over 700 people through events, workshops and questionnaires.

Over the past year, we have also been working with partners to start planning for our heritage centre and ensuring that we will be able to borrow exhibits and relics of local relevance from national and international sources. We are looking forward to working with partners such as Penrhyn Castle, Storiel, the Welsh Slate Museum, other areas of the UNESCO World Heritage Site, and many more.

Over a thousand followers follow these accounts. All the marketing and publicity work is shared between the Partnership's core staff but Abbie Jones our Marketing Mentor has supported staff to improve our marketing methods during 2024. We also have YouTube channels and a channel on www.amam.cymru.

Partneriaeth Ogwen also accepts requests to speak to local and national organizations about our projects and we conduct regular visits to our projects. These visits include community groups such as Cymunedoli Cyf and organizations such as Adra housing association. Our staff also provide presentations about our work at conferences and events all over Wales and our organization is profiled in a number of case studies.

In September 2024, one of Partneriaeth Ogwen's staff meetings was held at Penrhyn Castle. There was an introduction to the hidden corners of the Castle and it was great to literally see behind the 'facade' with a visit to the space above the roof of the Great Hall and other rooms where the plaster has rotted and the bricks are coming back to life. It was a good opportunity for the staff to think about local history and heritage and build a working relationship with the National Trust staff who work at the Castle - Ceri, Lois and Magi.





Networks and Partnership Projects


We continue to work in partnership with other organizations across Gwynedd and beyond to expand our work, campaign for the sector and gain access to further grants. An example of this is the recent collaboration with 33 community initiatives across Gwynedd to establish Cymunedoli Cyf.

This new initiative has collaborated with Menter Môn to attract SPF grant funding to fund 6 new community jobs in Gwynedd. In September it was great to welcome National Parks officers from all over Britain to Bethesda. There was a great discussion about sustainability, tourism and community development. Thanks to Eryri National Park for organizing the event.


Partneriaeth Ogwen Income Streams

Since our establishment in 2013, we have increased our income streams as an organisation. Originally, providing a clerking service was the organisation's main source of income but now, the clerking service is only 7% of our income with rents equivalent to 8% of our income. Our accounts this year reflect an increase again in the value of the grants we attract to the area which make up 81% of our income. The main grants we received in 2023 -24 were the Community Lottery grant towards the Dyffryn Caredig project and a variety of grants from Cyngor Gwynedd towards Hwb Ogwen. The advisory and administrative service is an income stream that we anticipate will grow over the coming year. Mainly because of more uncertainty about public grants and our desire to protect jobs by keeping the team of special staff we have in the organisation.

As well as analysing our income and expenditure as an organisation, we are now trying to look at the financial savings our work creates for the community. Many of our projects save money directly and indirectly e.g. Swpar Chwaral hot meals and Hwb Ogwen food packages save costs for local families and the benefits council can help individuals save significant amounts of money.
